At three years old, Luis had never spoken a single word. It was something that kept his mom, Sara, up at night - she felt lost, uncertain, and scared. After all, this was not the case with her two older children. She knew something was wrong. Why couldn't her son say "yes" and "no" and "mom" and "what are you doing?" like her other children had well before they were three? Why would he cry when he wanted something instead of just asking her? These were the questions that plaqued Sara's mind on a daily basis. She loved her son more than anything in the world. She wanted to be able to help him; she just didn't know how.

Luis and Sara were able to enroll in our Early Head Start Home-based program, where they began to receive professional support and guidance to work through the delays Luis was experiencing. It was determined that Luis had Autism. While this diagnosis was hard for Sara at first, she was relieved to know what was wrong. With support from their Early Head Start Family Educator, Sara began conducting activities with Luis that were individualized to his developmental needs. They'd sing. They'd read. They'd write. They worked non-stop, and every day Sara hoped for just one thing: for her son to speak his first word. And then. During a home visit Sara took out a big sheet of paper. In big letters she began to write: A, B, C...Luis watched as she wrote each letter.

And what happened next stunned the whole family. "Beeeee," Luis's little voice spoke, "Ceeeee." From the kitchen, Luis's father and aunt - their eyes as big as saucers – bolted to the dining room table where Luis sat, saying his first words. His mother dropped the crayon she was writing with and gasped as tears pooled in her eyes. Her baby had spoken his first words. He recognized the letters she was writing. He was going to be okay. Luis continues to make progress as his mother, family, and Early Head Start staff support his development.

Community Action Celebrates New Beginnings.

On June 23, 2016 Mayor Chris Beutler and Community Action announced the award of a five-year, \$31 million grant to administer Early Head Start and Head Start services in Lancaster and Saunders Counties.

As a result of this new five-year project, Community Action was able to open two new Early Childhood Education centers in the heart of Lincoln's highest needs neighborhoods. One, located at the Health 360 campus, serves 58 children and families, and the other, located within the west wing of the Kaplan University building, serves 197 children and families. In addition, 132 children ages birth to three and expectant women are served through an Early Head Start home-based program, and 34 children are served through a full-day program with summer enrichment in partnership with Wahoo Public Schools.


