From Head Start child to New York City lawyer

The profound impact of your investment 25 years later

Nhu-Y Ngo was three when she enrolled in Head Start. Born in Vietnam, Nhu-Y had recently immigrated to the United States with her mom and dad. As you might imagine, when they first arrived in Lincoln they had little to call their own. While they found shelter in the small room of a basement church, the space offered limited resources to

stimulate Nhu-Y's rapidly developing mind. Head Start filled that gap. Now 28 and a lawyer in New York City, Nhu-Y recalls what being in Head Start meant to her so many

years ago. Nhu-Y at her graduation from Columbia "When my University with her mom

parents decided to come to America, it was because they wanted to ensure a better future for me and my siblings, particularly in regard to education," she said. "Head Start opened me up to a whole new world. I remember many things about Head Start – my teachers, all of the bright colors in my classroom – but most of all, I remember this brown cloth bag full of books that I got to take home from class with me each week. I'd spend hours looking at those books just turning the pages, examining the words, and looking at the pictures. From that moment on, I was hooked on learning."

And learn she did. It was during her time in Head Start when Nhu-Y learned how to speak English, where she learned to recognize numbers, recite the alphabet, and how to write her name – both in English and Vietnamese.

It was also where she got to interact with other children for the very first time in her life."Even as a child, I can remember feeling isolated.Head Start gave me - and my family

¹ – opportunities to engage with and learn from others."

Head Start was what Nhu-Y describes as her "launching pad" to education. In 2005, she became the first in her family to graduate from high school, receiving a full scholarship to attend Columbia University. She went on to attend law school at UCLA and passed the California bar exam in Nhu-Y and her mom and dad photographed by the capital building just after landing in Lincoln from Vietnam

2014. She is now staff attorney at the Legal-Aid Society in New York City where she provides legal counsel and advocacy on behalf of immigrants and the under-represented.

"I credit Head Start for helping me to get where I am today," Nhu-Y said. "It was while I was in Head Start where I began my love for learning. Head Start was a place I wanted to go.And eventually school and college were also places I wanted to go, too. Head Start accepted me and my family how we were and helped us to adjust to a new environment. I really don't know where I'd be today if I hadn't been given that opportunity."

Community Action has been serving southeast Nebraska since 1965 – you may have been with us last fall when we commemorated our 50th year of service.

In our 50-year history, the importance of your support of our work to fight poverty is greater than ever. Though the city of Lincoln and outlying Lancaster and Saunders Counties fare well on many fronts, there are many indicators of significant need.To name just a few examples, the number of people living in poverty has increased by 58% since 2005; in 2000, Lincoln had zero neighborhoods in extreme poverty - we now have six; and nearly 44,000 of our neighbors face hunger every day, over one-third of whom are children.

Your support is so critical in keeping people stable and able to work toward better futures. Last year, your financial support allowed us to provide services to 15,696 individuals – services that kept families in their homes; alleviated hunger; allowed people to gain greater financial stability; and that prepared our community's youngest and most vulnerable children for success in school.

Thank you for providing hope to all of the children and adults who come through our doors each day. I hope this newsletter brings you half the amount of joy that you bring to so many people right here in our community each day.

A place to call their own

How your gift helped Crystal and her family to reach their dream of home ownership

When Crystal and her family first arrived in Lincoln, they had nothing to their name but a couple of suitcases and bus tickets. Without anywhere else to go, her family lived in a hotel room for months. Each night, Crystal struggled to hold back the tears as she rocked her child to sleep."I felt like a terrible mother," she recalls, "that I couldn't give my son a real home."

But Crystal was determined to achieve something better, driven by the love for her family. She enrolled in college classes to continue pursuit of a degree, found employment, and eventually moved her family into an apartment. Yet Crystal still dreamed of something even greater....of owning her own home.

Made possible through the financial support of donors like you, Crystal was able to enroll in our Individual Development Account program, which provides financial education and matched savings opportunities for low-to moderate-income individuals for the purchase of a first-time home, post-secondary education, or small business start-up. In the program, Crystal began working on fixing her credit and saving for a downpayment on a home – something she never thought she'd get



the opportunity to do otherwise.

"I started crying the day we closed on our house," Crystal said."Without you, and the words you gave me, I would still be lying in my bed because I was so embarrassed about who I was and how I was living.You gave me one key and you changed everything."

Nearly two years after purchasing their home, Crystal and her family are thriving. Thank you for investing in their dream, as well as those of so many others who are working hard to reach economic stability.

When his beloved wife Martha was being hospitalized for health complications due to cancer, Dwight Peterson thought that life couldn't possibly feel emptier. That was, until he was diagnosed with cancer himself two weeks later...

It seemed like an unbelievable scenario – one that Dwight struggled to believe himself. You see, up until very recently, Dwight and Martha had lived a good life – a life free of much pain and suffering. They'd raised their children right here

in Lincoln, owned their own home, and had jobs that afforded them the ability to live comfortably, even after they retired. Never once did they have to ask for help; nor did they ever plan to.

But neither one of them could have predicted that cancer would strike both of them in within a matter a twoweek time period.
