After having his life threatened by politicians in his home country, Amir had no choice but to leave his wife and three children behind and flee to the United States. After achieving asylee status in Vermont, Amir moved to Lincoln hoping to find a job and a safe place to call home. Without his family or a safe place to stay, it was critical that he find shelter. Amir found temporary shelter, but with rental deposit assistance through Community Action's Emergency Services program, he was able to secure an apartment of his own.

After getting settled in his new apartment, Amir's main priority was to save enough money to transport his wife and children from his home country to the United States. Amir maintained regular contact with his case manager at Community Action. He set a goal to take classes to become a Certified Nurse's Assistant. After months of hard work and saving. Amir had saved up enough money to pay in full for his certification classes. He was proud to report that he had graduated from his program, and is now working as a Certified Nurse's Assistant at a major medical facility in Lincoln. Amir independently pays all of his monthly bills, is succeeding in a well-paying career, and is in safe, affordable housing.

On Christmas Eve, Amir made a surprise visit to Community Action to introduce his family, who was finally able to move to the United States after two years of separation. Amir also shared that he was able to find a larger place to live to accommodate his family. Seeing Amir's family within our doors two years after our first encounter with him was a joyous experience. Amir was able to make his dream of having his family safely with him in the United States come true through unwavering hard work and perseverance. We feel honored to have been a part of Amir's remarkable journey to achieve economic stability.



Matched Savings program leads to stable futures for youth

When young people age out of the foster care system, their support systems abruptly end. Many in our state are coming together to create change in this system. During 2014, Community Action joined this effort in launching The Opportunity Passport program. It is a comprehensive matched savings program that provides resources to eligible youth to build a financially stable future through establishing sound financial habits, saving, and then purchasing one of the following assets: housing, transportation, medical, debt reduction, investments, micro-business start-up or expansion.

Kortnie, 21, was the first participant to make a purchase through Community Action's Opportunity Passport program, using her matched savings account to purchase a 2011 Ford Fusion. "Having a vehicle will allow me to get a better job, and continue my education. I feel more independent," said Kortnie. Having a safe, reliable vehicle will make it possible for her to stay on track to achieve her goals, and she has many. Kortnie recently completed schooling to become a registered nurse and is now pursuing a Bachelor of Science degree in nursing. Kortnie is just one of many young adults working toward a brighter future with support from the Opportunity Passport program.
