Concluding the program was Joyce Sturdy, one of six Gathering Place founders, who shared memories of The Gathering Place's first days of operation. The memories shared highlighted the intent of The Gathering Place when it first opened – as a space

where the stranger can enter and become a friend instead of an enemy; as a space designed to give people the opportunity to make change happen. Although service offerings at The Gathering Place have transformed over the years, this original intent remains present to this day.

The event provided an opportune time to kick off our 35th Anniversary Campaign for The Gathering Place. Thanks to generous contributions from Rogers Foundation, Union Bank & Trust. Greenwald Family Charitable Trust, Inspro Insurance, Unico Group, Inc., and Sue Ouambusch and Len Sloup, all donations received for The Gathering Place through December 31st will be matched \$.87 on the dollar. Community Action's board of directors gave the first donation at the event to honor the founders, whose collective vision has improved countless lives in the city.

As you know, there are 41,000 people right here in Lincoln who are struggling in poverty. With your support, we have the opportunity to serve more people – to fight poverty in a way that is responsive to the unique needs of our community. In fact, over our past fiscal year, we served 17,499 people - 1,700 more than the previous year. We wouldn't have been able to do it without you.

You may have seen over the past year that Community Action received honors as one of Lincoln's Best Places to Work. This was certainly very exciting, and I think it is a great reflection of the dedication and passion of our team. They are truly committed to our mission, supporting our participants in a way that is empowering... in a way that restores in them a

When her husband died unexpectedly, Judy's life was turned upside down

Your support brought her hope just when she thought things couldn't get worse

At just 35 years old, Judy Michaelson became a widow and single mother when her husband died unexpectedly in a car accident. As you can imagine, Judy's grief was unbearable. The pure shock from



the incident kept Judy paralyzed – she could barely eat...she couldn't sleep... she had no idea how to function. But somehow, she had to find a way. She had to find a way to do her best for her son, Ben. And that's what she did. She woke up at 6:30 every morning to get Ben off to school. She washed his clothes after baseball practice. She heated up the frozen meals that her friends had brought over for dinner. She eventually went back to work. And she tried every day to put on a brave face... to maintain at least some sense of normalcy in a very turbulent time.

One afternoon, about a month after her husband died, Judy came home from work and flipped on the light switch in the foyer. But the light didn't shine. Confused, she flicked the light switch again and again...still nothing. She tried the light switch in the kitchen, and then

the living room. Nothing. She went down to the basement to check the breaker. All seemed fine. And then it hit her... she had forgotten to pay the electric bill...her fears were confirmed upon seeing the shut-off notice on her front door.

Judy instantly went into a panic... how, she asked herself, *could she let this happen*? The panic turned into tears as she thought about what her son would think when he got home from school. She knew she had to act quickly. Letting her son come home to this was not an option.

She dialed the phone and was eventually connected with our Emergency Services department. She explained the situation...my husband used to handle paying all of our bills, she told us, doing her best not to cry. And because of your support of Emergency Services, and our partnership with Lincoln Electric System, we were able to approve Judy for assistance on the spot. And her lights were on when Ben got home from school.

Wood paneling lines the walls of the living and dining rooms, amplifying the glow of the amber lights and warmth radiating from the wood stove. You feel the love and happiness that surrounds

you...you feel the comfort and familiarity of *home*.

Jenika and Michael Mullins recently purchased their new home with support from our Individual Development Accounts program – with support from donors like you. While in the program, Jenika and Michael worked to build their credit and learned everything they needed to know about buying a first-time home. They also received a 4:1 savings match for their down payment.

"This is something we have dreamed of for years," says Jenika. "Getting to this point has taken a lot of hard work, and we are thankful for the program and its donors for supporting us along the way."

In speaking with Jenika and Michael, there is a great amount of pride in the life that they have built for themselves and their family. Their kitchen table, which they gather around each night for dinner, is engraved with words describing their family: a circle of strength, founded on faith, joined in love, kept by God, together forever. Everything they have is the result of hard work and dedication. Both

Jenika and Michael work 70-80 hours each week while raising their two young children and fostering Jenika's teenage sister. And despite all that Jenika and Michael have on their proverbial plate, they continue to dream. Eventually they hope to open their own business specializing in selling outdoor and sporting equipment. "We've already written a business plan," says Jenika. And it's in the way that she says it, so confidently and definitively, that you know it will happen someday.

When leaving the Mullins home, the pathway to your vehicle illuminated by decorative lighting fixtures contrasting the night sky, it occurs to you that Jenika and Michael's lives have changed not just because they are new homeowners – but because they have the belief in their ability to realize their dreams.
